From the Desk of the Tumuaki

Welcome to the 2024 school year. We hope you have had a superb summer break, enjoyed celebrating Christmas, and had a great time with your family. We have a full team of excellent staff, a growing roll and a lot of great things planned for this year. We are looking forward to rolling these out and watching our kids grow.

We have a large number of new students starting over the next few days. We welcome the following students and their families; Christopher Fouhy, Joy Lecky and Malea Meisterhan in the Junior class, Marcus Oh, Imani-Mariah Goodare, Han-ju Marx, Deacon Morley, Aldrian and Aldrich Muli in our Year 2/3 class, John Gabriel Magan and Carter and Hunter Henn in our Year 4 class, Blake Henn and Zephaniah Goodare in our Year 5/6 class, and Beulah Goodare, Thomas McCallum, Adriel Magan and Rafael Pana in our Year 7/8 class. This now gives us 99 students, the highest we have been for a very long time, and only two short of the 101 we need and have been praying for to have our extra classroom fully funded by the government. This of course will make a very big difference to our school finances too so we ask you to pray with us for this.

We have eight more new entrants enrolled to start during the year. As a result this actually means we only have 13 places left before our roll is full at 120! If you know anyone who is hoping to enrol during the year we would recommend you get them to do so as soon as possible to reserve their spot.

Having High Expectations

At Matamata Christian School we have always prided ourselves on having high expectations of our students. One of the great things about working in a school such as this is that you know that when parents send their children here they really want them to be here and do well. Our parents have high hopes for their children and so do our staff.

Let me encourage you to share your high hopes with your children. Our core value this term is respect and part of developing this in ourselves is understanding never to settle for less, regardless of what we feel inclined to do. Likewise, we should always expect the best from ourselves and each other in the way we treat people, elders, God, property and the environment. It is part of our Christian character development.

I once shared with you some research carried out in the United Kingdom about high expectations. There they had taken two groups of similar ability students. One of these groups was told that they were all expected to pass the course they were doing, and in the end they all did. The other group was told that it was a very tough course but to just do their best. Only one third of this group passed! The power of your words, your expectations and your encouragement is significant.

Let me also remind you of another story I have shared many times before. In a principal's meeting I once attended an educational expert shared with us a photograph of the 2010 medical graduates in Auckland. He asked us what we noticed. Every graduate in the photo was of Asian descent. When asked why this was so people suggested a common argument that Asians tend to be very bright. It was interesting to then have revealed to us that the average IQ of Asians is in fact lower than the average IQ of New Zealanders! So what was the difference? It was simple, Asian parents expected their children to work hard to achieve and never give up. It was alright to not understand something, but instead of getting frustrated and giving up, children were taught to say, "This is really hard and I don't get it...yet. But I'm going to keep working at it until I do

get it."

There are lots of things that are going to be hard in both life and at school. We need our children to accept this and have the determination to persevere at all they do. We try to shape our classes and learning to achieve this and we want you to encourage this in your children too. It's perseverance, also called resilience.

All our staff are here to help every student do better and better all the time. Even the resources we invest into are aimed to achieve this.

So this year please partner with us in encouraging high but realistic expectations in your children. Help them to goal set and then believe that they can achieve and do well in all areas they strive for, even if this has been an area of difficulty in the past. Don't let them ever give in.

SPORTS ACADEMY IS BACK FOR 2024!

In 2023 we started our new Sports Academy which has been a big hit with our students and families. Now it's back for 2024.

Aimed at students Year 3 and up, the MCS Sports Academy is run after school each Thursday afternoon, 3:15—4:30PM, by a faithful group of parents, and will start in our third week back on Thursday the 15th of February. Students are taught general ball and fine motor skills, specific sports skills and will develop their fitness.

The vision of Sports Academy is to have our students better prepared for playing sports and to develop in them a healthy passion for moving, staying fit, enjoying developing physical skills and competing. We want them to be better prepared, fitter and more skilled when we hit the first games of the season.

Outside of Sports Academy our students get the opportunity to be involved in after school leagues or Saturday sports in Futsal, Minball, Touch Rugby, Cricket, Netball and Hockey. Beyond that parents can enrol them in club level Soccer and Rugby. Sports Academy intentionally contributes to their development in all these codes.

We want as many of our students from Year 3 up to sign up and commit to being part of this development (it is not a commitment to signing up for a sport), and we really need as many parents coming to help run this as possible please. This is an excellent way for parents to be able to be a part of something great with your children. If you have a passion or drive for any sports please consider helping us train our children. TERM 1 TOPICS

Every year we review and develop our teaching curriculum to meet the needs of our students. We have always been very proud of the curriculum we develop and

the topics we teach in 2024 will be no different. Each year our needs change and areas of student's competencies and social needs adjust too. We believe over the years we have developed an excellent curriculum that responds to this.

In the first term of each year we always have our Kid on the Rock unit. This is a two year programme that this year looks at who your child is, how they fit into their school and the world around them, and why your family is so special and should be treasured. The second part of this unit helps them to understand how they learn effectively and helps them develop learning tools and critical thinking skills they can employ throughout their schooling. In Year 2 of the cycle (next year), we look at our heritage and delve into Aotearoa New Zealand history.

As part of our Kid on the Rock unit this year we have our biannual whole school camp at Finlay Park Adventure Camp on the banks of Lake Karapiro. More details will follow soon about this but at this point it is set to be in the first week of next term. Camp is one of the few things we charge for, and while cost details are still to come, families can start paying toward this now.

Whole school camp is about new experiences and facing new challenges, and bonding our school and community together. For most activities we operate out of our four house teams which helps students identify with their team and bond strongly. We encourage parents to come and be part of camp with us to be part of this process. For those who need to be at work during the day, Finlay Park is close to Matamata so you can consider joining us for any of the evening programmes.

Our whole curriculum is designed to be impacting. At our heart we are partnering with you to help develop your children academically, spiritually, physically and to be emotionally well balanced.

So, other than Reading, Writing and Mathematics our topics can be found on the chart on this page. (Note Year 7 and 8 will not be part of the *Great Art Swap* this year as much of this content is also covered in the Tech Arts programme they have at the Intermediate).

Each year I like to remind parents of the following point. One of the biggest ways you can help your child with their academic learning and their ability to learn how to socialise, work with and get on with others, is to make time to talk to them every day. Ask them about their learning, about their friends, and their understanding of God. Recognise that because they are growing and learning to understand their world they will not always interpret things correctly. That's why they need to talk to you so much. A statistic I remind people of explains that 80% of the feedback a child gets is from their peers, and of that feedback 80% of it is always wrong! This isn't just about their work but about their understanding of life and friendships too. Please take the time to listen to and input into their lives.





Can we ask one more thing of you too? From time to time children will share something that doesn't always make sense or sounds concerning. If this happens please take the time to discuss it with your child's teacher. Children do not always have the right end of the stick and this can usually be quickly sorted with a swift polite visit.

Sometimes there are things that happen that teachers don't know about but could do with knowing. This can be very beneficial for helping staff deal with different matters and it helps diffuse situations before they ever become big ones. The same can be said if you have a complaint. We do want to know and sort potential problems.

With an additional class in the mix and a superb staff we are full of expectation for what this year will bring.

SCHOOL UNIFORM

A big thank you to all those who came in and sorted their school uniform last week, and for everyone having their stationery ready for today.

Please can you make sure that each item of your children's uniform is named. This makes it very easy to return if it is found roaming around looking for its owner!

Please remember black sandals are our footwear in summer but we recommend you check the quality of these before buying them. Sandals need to be plain black. While there are a range of acceptable ones please note they cannot be fashion items or notably label branded. We are only accepting other types of footwear where this is accompanied by a doctors note explaining why an alternative is needed. Every student must also wear a school hat in Terms 1 and 4 for sun safe protection. These can be bought at school and are designed to be practical and give excellent protection.



PLEASE WATCH YOUR SPEED

Please note that during peak school hours at the start and end of each school day the speed limit around schools drops to 40km/h. In the first few weeks of term the Police are particularly vigilant about

monitoring this and driver behaviours around schools.

Please also recognise and respect the 10km/h speed limit within the school carpark. Unfortunately children get distracted and are not good at looking for cars or at judging their speed. Where possible please drop off and pick up your children on the school footpath

side of the carpark to reduce the need for students to need to cross over in the carpark.


