This internal slider separates the main classroom from a small breakout space beside it where students work in small groups or can be withdrawn to work with an adult. Over the last weekend the painting happened around each of these new sliders bringing this project to completion.

The next stage of our upgrades is the fitting of new classroom carpet into Room 3. This is scheduled to take place in the coming school holidays.



From the Desk of the Tumuaki

Last week was marred by the tragedy of a local Matamata College student whose life was ended prematurely as she crossed the railway line. I know this event has impacted many of our students and families. We have talked about this in our two older classes and talked about both rail and road safety too. It is always hard to make sense of tragedies but please know the offer still stands that if anyone needs any support to please contact the school.

Our Local History

This term, as part of our heritage in our Kid on the Rock unit, we have been studying Aotearoa New Zealand history. Some of our local history is rich and steeped in Christian roots but unfortunately many do not know our stories. While our Year 1—3 students directly learn about some of these events we rarely get an opportunity to share about them as a community.

Today I want to share about the story of Tarore and the impact her life had on this area.

Many of you will have heard of Te Waharoa and what a legendary fighting chief he was. Te Waharoa lived for battle and thrived on it. He led Ngāti Hauā and was not only very strong and powerful, but was a shrewd man in the art of war. Ngāti Hauā thrived under his reign.

One of the things Te Waharoa had the foresight to see was the part the early missionaries were to play and what they could offer his tribe. He saw that with the missionaries came opportunities. While he was not a believer he knew there were going to be benefits in inviting the missionaries to come and base themselves within his people. He requested missionaries to come and live with them and Alfred and Charlotte Brown were assigned to them.

With missionaries such as the Browns came opportunities for trading and education for the children. Many learned to read and write, and several including Wiremu Tāmihana and Wiremu Ngākuku grew up under this and became powerful Christian chiefs who would have a tremendous impact on their people.

Peace was an unusual concept in the 1830's amongst Māori. War was a constant as land, resources and honour was fought over continually. Whenever a tribe was overwhelmed and lost they would seek utu, revenge. The common rule of battle was that whatever your enemy did to you must be repaid twice over. You can imagine from this how war just multiplied over time.

By the time Ngākuku was a chief he was promoting peace but not all his tribe believed in God or in peace as he did. Many were seeking war against Te Arawa in Rotorua and had prepared themselves for this. Seeing that war had become inevitable Ngāku-



ku took his family and a contingent of others on a trek over the Kaimais to safety in Te Papa in Tauranga. As they travelled he had tied his copy of the Gospel of Luke, given to him by the Browns, around the neck of his eldest daughter, Tārore, to carry and keep in safe keeping for him. That night the group camped at a hut often used by travellers at the base of the Wairere Falls.

That night as they went to bed the leftover fire of their camp attracted the attention of a Ngāti Whakaue war party from Rotorua creeping through the bush. Before dawn, believing they had come by an enemy camp, the war party fell on the tent of an Englishman outside the hut, taking everything he owned. The noise of their ransacking and the sound of a barking dog alerted the rest of the party in the hut. Ngākuku could not wake Tārore, and only just escaped to higher ground with his younger child as the enemy rushed inside.

Up until sunrise the Rotorua warriors taunted Ngākuku who waited on a ridge above to save his daughter. The enemy though had killed her, took the book she was protecting so carefully and removed some of her body parts for sacrifice.

Ngākuku carried the broken body of his daughter home that morning and buried her the next day. The tribe plotted revenge but Ngākuku would have nothing of it. Rebuking his people he said, "There lies my child; she has been murdered as a payment for your bad conduct. But do not rise up to obtain satisfaction for her. God will do that. Let this be the



conclusion of the war with Rotorua. Let peace be now made. My heart is not sad for Tārore, but for you. You wished for teachers to come to you; they came, and now you are driving them away. You are weeping for my daughter, but I am weeping for you—for myself—for all of us. Perhaps this murder is a sign of God's anger for our sins. Turn to Him; believe, or you will all perish."

Meanwhile the chief of Ngāti Whakaue returned home wondering why the book Tārore had was so worth protecting. Much later he had the opportunity to have it read and interpreted for him. As this happened the love of Christ swept over him and with incredible remorse he changed and gave himself to God.

He knew he had to make things right with Ngākuku and so several years later he asked to visit him. Both chiefs were encouraged not to do so for fear of utu but they did it anyway. And Ngākuku did forgive. He could see he was a changed man and together they knelt and prayed together.

This is said to be the start of the peace movement which would sweep down the country and change tribes. And this very significant change all started in our backyard, with the love of God pouring out and changing the course of our countries people.

This is an event where our Year 4—8 students compete against students from Southcity, Waipa, Paeroa, Lake Taupō and Hamilton Christian School's, Bethlehem Chapman College, and Hamilton and Rotorua SDA Schools in a purpose built athletics arena. They will compete in their age groups in sprints, long jump, and the cricket ball throw or shotput. The competition is fierce and we are most keen to hold onto the trophy!

We've received lots of parent support for the day. We need to move 79 students across to Hamilton and we are very grateful for all the offers of help, thank you so much.

Most people have already signed for permission for their children to go on trips such as this but if you do not want your child to attend please let their teacher know as soon as possible.

We are intending to leave school at 8:15AM and will be back by 3PM for the school buses.

JUNIORS FIRTH TOWER TRIP

On **Thursday the 3rd of March** our two Junior classes (Miss Thomasen and Mrs Atkin's classes) will be having a local fieldtrip to Firth Tower. This is part of the work they have been doing in local Matamata history. This promises to be an exciting trip and students are very welcome to dress up in olden day attire to help get the most out of the day.

YEAR 7/8 NORTHLAND CAMP

This term the school is studying Aotearoa New Zealand history. Included with this the junior school studies Matamata history which is



steeped in Christian foundations. The middle school studies Waikato history, and the senior school looks in depth at early New Zealand history.

As part of their studies each class will be involved in fieldtrips.

The senior class, however, have a bi-annual camp up to Northland where some of New Zealand's earliest history took place. This four day trip has been organised for the first week of Term 2, Tuesday the 29th of April—Friday the 2nd of March.

This trip is about exploring the spaces and people we have been studying during Term 1. Our students get to walk in the footsteps of those who shaped the nation in the early times. We stay at Russell, New Zealand's first capital. There our students explore whaling, early trade and rule, Pompallier House, the oldest church in New Zealand with bullet holes in the side from the Land Wars, Hone Heke's flagstaff he had chopped down in defiance to the British, and hear tales of events that make your eyes bulge!

They also spend time at Waitangi exploring Te Tiriti o Waitangi and reinact parts of the Treaty signing, explore people who impacted what New Zealand has become, visit the Stone Store and Kemp House at Kerikeri which is an old mission station and the oldest existing house in the country, and we go out to Marsden Cross where the Christian message was preached for the first time. There the same message is retold.

During our time we also go out sailing on a legendary sailing ship and visit the famous artist Hundertwasser's Museum and sites.

This is an action packed four days designed to be impactful and to help history come alive. Great memories are formed that will last a lifetime.

In the past Hamilton SDA School has joined us for this epic event but now both our schools have become too big so we have split. However, Whakatanē SDA School, with their six students, have asked us to take them so they can experience this too. This is a chance for our students to get to know another school from within our block of Christian schools.

We want parents to come and support us too and we've had great uptake already. We don't want anyone to miss out but we are restricted in numbers. If you want to come and haven't let us know yet please tell Mrs Marx, Mrs Fawcett or Mr Paterson immediately to indicate that you would like to come.

This year's costs will be \$320 per student and \$285 for an adult. This can be paid now or paid off in instalments over the year. Camps are one of the few school activities we charge for above attendance dues.

HELPING RAISE FUNDS FOR THE COMMUNITY

The wider Matamata community have announced they are raising funds for a new playground for the Matamata community. The current one near the town's Netball courts is up for a major upgrade and \$100 000 is the target amount to make this happen.

Calling themselves Project Play the playground development is aimed at our current generation of children and the ones to follow. Because of this they are asking for all children in our community to be involved.

The plan is to hold a community Colour Fun Run on the afternoon of this Friday the 21st of March as a fundraising event. Pre-schoolers through to College students are being asked to participate and help raise money for this. Students run as a school (Matamata Christian School is our team). Our students can run on the day at 11AM.

The event is being run through an organisation called 'Go Raise It' who help raise money for the playground. Students are being asked to set up their own fundraising page through them and to get people to donate through this. This then means your children do not need to collect any money. Like all the other Matamata schools we are keen to support this. However, there is a catch for us in that this event is being run on the same day as our school's Teacher Only Day. This means to take part families will need to take their children to the event and supervise them. Because of our commitment to teacher development that day no school staff are available.

COMMUNITY NOTE

Matamata Christian School values feedback and believes this is an important way for it to improve its performance. It believes complaints are a part of this and wishes to be able to resolve these in order to avoid anything standing in the way of it achieving its goals. Therefore anyone who may have a complaint about any part of the school life is encouraged to bring those complaints forward in a biblical manner. This means:

To resolve conflict -

"If your brother sins against you, go to him and show him his fault. But do it privately, just between yourselves. If he listens to you, you have won your brother back. But if he will not listen to you, take one or two other persons with you, so that 'every accusation may be upheld by the testimony of two or more witnesses', as the scripture says."

"Remember this, my dear friends! Everyone must be quick to listen, but slow to speak and slow to become angry."



EPRO8 TRIALS

Epro8 trials have begun for our



Year 5—8 students. Epro8 is an engineering problem solving challenge where students are given a set time, a problem to solve and equipment to build with in a set time to create a working solution. They are in a team of four and are not allowed to communicate with anyone outside their team. Our school has been involved in this challenge for a number of years and achieved some great results.

During the trials students put their names forward to be considered and then get to work within a team to see how they do. Students get final selection based on their ability to

work constructively with teammates, problem solve and think under pressure. Only four can be selected for Years 5—6 and then for 7—8. The teams selected will go on to compete against other teams in a few weeks time.



SCOLA MUFTI DAY

Last week we celebrated our first Scola mufti day for the year. Scola is our World Vision sponsor child from Uganda the school supports as part of the outworking of our compassion and service core values we have in the school. Every term we have a mufti day to raise the money we need in order to support Scola.

GIVING TO RESOURCES

Recently a number of people have been asking if either they or their business can contribute financially toward anything the school is



specifically aiming to develop. This is an incredibly generous offer and we really appreciate it. Funding we receive is limited and rarely covers everything we do. It is only because of God and giving from others that the school has been able to provide the huge range of things it does.

This year we are dealing with growth, expanding existing programming, and introducing new programming too. Here are some of the strategic things we are trying to develop if anyone wants to help us build toward them:

- Because of considerable growth we are trying to increase the number of iPads we have for classroom use, particularly from Years 1—5. The price for schools is lower than normal market costs.
- This year we are introducing sewing to our Tech Arts programme at Years 7—8 that we are developing ourselves. Our students have not had this opportunity before. Sewing machines are for the long term and we hope will offer up further opportunities beyond Tech Arts.
- We want to expand what we do in robotics. So far we do coding and Lego robotics from Years 1—8 and we are looking to expand this in 2025.

If you are keen to help build any of these resources with us across the school (or in any other area) please come and see us. Even small contributions can help us increase what we put in front of our students.
