From the Desk of the Tumuaki

This has been a big term for us this year. We have really enjoyed having awesome new staff and families join us which has really added to our school. This week we are pleased to welcome two new families who have started today. Ava (Year 3) and Addison (Year 5) are from the Park family and many of you will know them. And Zinaske Hamann joins us in Year 5 also. We are thrilled to have the Park and Hamann family join our school family.

Thank you to all those who have been getting their enrolments in for this year. Because we are so close to full we are asking people who have children you want to come here in 2025 to get their enrolments in too as we are not expecting to have many spare spaces. Since our roll has become so full we have even begun getting enrolments in now for 2026 and 2027!

Easter

We have entered into the Easter season and so it is an opportune time, a fortnight out, to consider Jesus' ministry. Here I want to show you a timeline of Jesus work when we put everything together from what we know from the Gospels, and I want to provoke you with your thinking. Many of our traditions and timings around Easter and Christmas are not necessarily founded on actual events. These don't really matter too much as it is what God did through Jesus that matters most, not the timeline of when we celebrate these things. But still they are an interesting provocation. So let's take a look at Jesus ministry in chronological order:

Autumn, 28AD

Jesus left Nazareth, where he was raised, and went down to Bethabara for His baptism. Right after the baptism, He went to the Mount of Temptation where He was tempted by Satan. He went back to Salem and then Cana, Nathaniel's hometown. The first disciples were from there – John, Andrew, Peter, Philip, and Nathaniel.

Spring, 29AD

The first miracle was at the wedding in Cana; Jesus then moved to Capernaum, where he established His base of operations. While Jesus was at the Passover in Jerusalem, Nicodemus, a leader of the Jews, came to Him by night. Jesus explained that he needed to be born again, which gave rise to the most famous verse in the entire Bible,

> For God so loved the world, that He gave His only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. – John 3:16

This was also about the time of John the Baptist's last testimony.

Winter, 29AD

Jesus met the woman at the well at Sycar. From there He went back to Cana and healed the son of a royal official. He also healed someone at the pool of Bethesda.

Spring, 30AD

At this time John the Baptist had been imprisoned in Jerusalem. In Galilee, Jesus had begun to broaden His public ministry. At the synagogue in Nazareth He declared His mandate by reading from Isaiah. The townspeople tried to throw Him off a cliff, so He left Nazareth and made His base in Capernaum. There He called four disciples.

Peter and his brother Andrew were fishing partners with James and John. They had fished all night and caught nothing. At midday, Jesus asked Peter to take him a little way into the Sea of Galilee so He could teach. After He finished, Jesus said, "Let's go out deeper and fish." Peter said, "You're wasting your time. We fished all night and caught nothing." But they went out anyway and caught so many fish the nets started to break. Then they began to realise they were dealing with more than just a prophet.



During this time Peter's mother-in-law and a leper were healed.

Summer, 30AD

In Capernaum, Jesus healed a paralytic. This is about when Matthew was called. Jesus and His disciples picked grain on the Sabbath, and again on the Sabbath, Jesus healed the man with the withered hand. His fame started to spread in the region. The Sermon on the Mount was delivered about this time. Jesus healed a centurion's servant.

Autumn, 30AD

In Capernaum again, Jesus healed a blind and dumb man, but He was accused of doing this by the powers of Satan. From then on, Jesus spoke publicly only in parables so the truth would be hidden to all but His own. That may shock you, but it was fulfilling a prophecy in Isaiah.

After the seven kingdom parables of Matthew 13, the die was cast; the nation was on its path. They accused the Son of God of being of Satan.

On a ship from Capernaum to Gadara, a very severe storm arose quickly. That is not unusual in that region, but it is unlikely this was a normal storm because these were professional fishermen on board and they were terrified for their lives. And when Jesus calmed the storm, He 'rebuked' the storm. It is likely Satan was anticipating what was going to happen in Gadara, when Jesus encountered the demoniac who recognised Him as the Son of God and apparently was aware of His destiny!

The demons (2 000 of them) then asked Jesus to be allowed to go into a nearby herd of pigs, and Jesus permitted it! Why? Likely to demonstrate to us that demons are real, and not just some disorder people have. The pigs then ran off the cliff and died. The disciples went back to Capernaum.

Winter, 30AD

Two incidents occurred at the same time: Jairus's daughter was raised and a woman with an issue of blood was healed. Although they appear unrelated, the Holy Spirit seems to link those two events. Jesus was on His way to save a 12 year old Jewish girl and on the way a Gentile woman, who had suffered for twelve years, was healed by faith.

Two blind men and a dumb and possessed man were also healed. Jesus arrived in Nazareth; again, people took offense. John the Baptist was beheaded about this time for preaching against the immorality of the leader, and the apostles were sent out in pairs. Jesus then returned to Capernaum.

Spring, 31AD

Back in Capernaum, the twelve apostles returned. Jesus retired to Bethsaida, which became a major base. During this time He fed the 5 000 and returned to Capernaum. And it was on this trip that Jesus walked on water. His sermon on the Bread of Life occurred here. Around this time He was accused of eating with unwashed hands, etc.

While other schools may be asking for all students to go home for the afternoon, our intention is to stay open. The Year 1—4 classes will run as per normal and we will send Year 5—8 students to carry on with their work across these three classes. If, however, you are in a position for your Year 5—8 child to be picked up and come home early that would be helpful for us and would reduce the numbers being looked after in the other classes. If this works for you please let the class teacher know. Year 1—4 students do not need to leave early, in fact we would like for them to stay at school.

TIMELINE OF JESUS continued from page 2

Spring 31AD

In Capernaum, He took a summer residence in Tyre. He helped a Canaanite woman and a Gentile and then went to the region of Decapolis. (This was all Gentile country).

He healed a deaf and dumb man, fed the 4 000, then went to Megdela where the Pharisees demanded a sign. Then He took a ship to Bethsaida, where He talked about the leaven of the Pharisees.

Jesus travelled north to Caesarea Philippi. This is where He asked His disciples, "Whom do people say that I am?" (That's the key question in all of our lives: Who do we say Jesus is?) This was Peter's grandest moment: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God." And it was on that foundation that Jesus would build His Church.

Jesus went up to the Mount of Transfiguration (many scholars believe this to be Mount Hermon) where He was transfigured in front of the three disciples (insiders), Peter, James and John. Peter wanted to make three booths, which is why some people think this was in Autumn: it was around the time of the Feast of Tabernacles. (Peter in his second letter alludes to this). After healing a possessed boy, Jesus went back to Capernaum.

Jesus went down to Jerusalem to celebrate the Feast of Tabernacles where He declared Himself to be the Living Water. He forgave the woman taken in adultery, then returned to Galilee.

Winter, 31AD

During this time the Samaritans rejected Him. He went to Perea, an area east of the Jordan, and, among other things, presented several parables: the Good Samaritan, the Unrighteous Servant, and the Rich Man and Lazarus. This is also where he sent out the 70.

He travelled to Jerusalem and healed a man born blind. The Good Shepherd story occurred there during Hanukkah. (The New Testament shows the importance of Hanukkah; it's a key to understanding the end times). And He battled at Bethabara.

Spring, 32AD

Jesus travelled from Bethabara to Bethany, which was His headquarters when He was in the Jerusalem area because it was within a Sabbath day's journey from the Temple. This is where Lazarus was raised from the dead. Immediately the Jewish leaders plotted to kill both Lazarus and Jesus, so Jesus moved to the village of Ephraim. Travelling again through Perea, He encountered the ten lepers and gave a number of parables. Also at this time was the ambitious request of the mother of James and John, the sons of Zebedee: she wanted her two sons to sit on each side of Him when He entered into His Kingdom.

Jesus travelled back to Jericho where He healed blind Bartimeus. Then Jesus called Zaccheus, the little man in the tree, and presented the Parable of the Ten Talents. Then He went to Bethany for the final week.

(The trip from Jericho to Bethany was six days prior to Passover. Jericho was more than a Sabbath day's journey, so as an obedient Jew, Jesus could not have taken this trip on a Saturday. Therefore, Passover could not actually have been on a Friday that year and therefore why Jesus could not have been crucified on a Friday).

This has been assembled from the research compiled by Dr Chuck Missler and my thanks goes to him for this.

SCHOOL CAMP

Every two years, as part of our Term 1 Kid on the Rock unit, we have our whole

school camp at Finlay Park Adventure Camp. This is a fantastic event in our calendar where we take the whole school out to camp for three nights. This has traditionally been during Term 1 but this year, to take advantage of the best available

accommodation and facilities, we will have it in the first week of Term 2. The dates are Sunday the 28th of April to Wednesday the 1st of May.

Camp starts at 4PM on the Sunday when you can arrive and set your children up in their cabins. Families are encouraged to all come and bring your own family picnic to enjoy from 5PM. After



dinner we will have family church together. At the end of this camp will officially begin and parents not staying can say goodbye and leave us to it. Juniors will prepare for bed and the older children will play games together.

Camp officially ends at 3PM on Wednesday the 1st. Families need to please arrange for your children to be picked up.

We have run whole school camps every two years over the last 16 years now. This is a great way to bond our school, house teams and community together. Regardless of age we get to provide our students with fantastic outdoor experiences, great learning and provide them with fresh challenges.

Because the purpose of camp is about bonding our school together and building school culture, we intentionally have it fairly close to home. Finlay Park are friends of the school and do a brilliant job of hosting us. The camp is only 20—25 minutes from Matamata and is located on stunning grounds on the banks of Lake Karapiro. Parents are welcome and encouraged to

come and be part of camp for the whole three nights, join us for a day, or drop out for a visit after work and be part of the fun. If you want to attend camp we also need to have a Police Vet check done for all volunteers. Please come to the office as soon as possible to help us get this done (checks are valid for three years and let you be involved in other events with us too).

Camp is a very important part of our programme and has a very big impact on every child, regardless of age. If you have any concerns please come and talk these through with your classroom teacher or with Mr Paterson.



The cost of camps have gone up

significantly but we have worked hard to keep these down for everyone. We are pleased to be able to keep the costs down to **just \$210** for students and adults this year. To achieve this we will need to ask families to also send along some baking or biscuits for camp please. If you have children with dietary needs please make your baking or biscuits to suit them and label it for us.

Some families may struggle with costs but note you can start paying these off now and you have until the end of the school year to finish paying it off if you need this. If you are in a position to be able to contribute any extra amount to help those in need please let us know too. We want to make sure everyone gets to go as camp provides valuable experiences to our children.



Camp forms will start coming home in the coming weeks for you to fill in and return please. These will outline activities, ask you to update health needs, and get you to outline any dietary requirements.

INTER CHRISTIAN SCHOOL ATHLETICS

Still More News - Kawepūrongo

Families will be aware that one of the policies of the new coalition government is a ban on cellphones in schools. Schools are required to have a policy in place and to consult with the school community on what this is. Below is the policy which has been developed for Matamata Christian School. Please feel free to come back to us if you have any thoughts that need to be considered.

Cellphones and Other Personal Digital Devices

A personal **digital device** is any privately owned digital device that is not part of any school-approved **Bring Your Own Device (BYOD)** programme.

With the exception of Year 7/8 students bringing iPads as part of BYOD, Matamata Christian School does not recommend that students bring personal digital devices to the school. These are not necessary to have during the day. However, we understand that some parents like their children to have a device to communicate with them after school.

We discuss the school rules about personal digital devices at the beginning of the year, and throughout the year as needed. Any changes to our school rules are communicated to students and our school community.

Parent / Caregiver and Student Responsibilities

If a parent / caregiver needs to contact their child urgently during the day, they should call the school office.

If a student brings a personal digital device to our school, the following guidelines apply:

- The school does not accept responsibility for lost, damaged, or stolen personal digital devices brought to the school but investigates any issues as appropriate.
- Cellphones brought to school must be handed in to the school office from the time a student arrives at school until after the bell at the end of the day. These cannot be used without permission from the office or teacher during the day and this will only be given under special circumstances.
- The school does not recommend smart watches come to school. Smart watches that do not communicate are, however, approved. Where a parent wants their child to wear a smart watch with a communication function this can be considered by the school. This cannot be used by the child to receive communications other than by the parents and cannot be used to send communications within school hours. Permission to wear one will be revoked if it is.
- Only BYOD iPads at Years 7/8 and school iPads may be used in class and only under the rules set by the classroom teacher. These will not normally be allowed to be used outside class time.
- Students can only take digital devices on school trips with special permission and by way of planning with the teacher. These guidelines and other relevant school policies apply.

Students are expected to follow our **Digital Technology and Online Safety** policy when using personal digital devices on school property or the school network.

Inappropriate Use

If we have a report of or see a student using a personal digital device inappropriately, we will confiscate it. After the student locks the device, we place it in the school office to be collected at the end of the day. If it is a serious or repeated incident we will ask for a parent to collect it. Inappropriate use of a personal digital device may include:

- using the device when not permitted
- any sort of bullying, including online bullying
- taking photos or videos of other people without their permission
- viewing, sharing, downloading or attempting to download obscene or inappropriate content
- forwarding inappropriate messages or content

Inappropriate use of a personal digital device is managed through the school **Behaviour Management**, **Responding to Digital Incidents**, and **Surrender and Retention of Personal Digital Devices** policies and procedures, as appropriate.

COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES

COMMUNITY NOTE

Matamata Christian School values feedback and believes this is an important way for it to improve its performance. It believes complaints are a part of this and wishes to be able to resolve these in order to avoid anything standing in the way of it achieving its goals. Therefore anyone who may have a complaint about any part of the school life is encouraged to bring those complaints forward in a biblical manner. This means:

To resolve conflict -

"If your brother sins against you, go to him and show him his fault. But do it privately, just between yourselves. If he listens to you, you have won your brother back. But if he will not listen to you, take one or two other persons with you, so that 'every accusation may be upheld by the testimony of two or more witnesses', as the scripture says." – Matthew 18:15-16


In response to complaints -

Please remember that complaints can be embarrassing for people. It is important to respect a person's integrity by approaching them in confidence first to resolve this rather than sharing this with others. If a complaint is about wrongdoing between students at school please do not try to resolve this directly between other parents but get the classroom teacher to resolve this between families.
