# INTER CHRISTIAN SCHOOL ATHLETICS

Last week our Year 4—8 students spent the day in Hamilton for the annual Inter Christian Schools Athletics Competition. This takes place at Porritt Stadium in Hamilton, a purpose built Athletics venue with excellent competition facilities.

This year more schools were involved than in previous years. Our students were up against Hamilton Christian School, Southcity Christian School, Hamilton SDA, Waipa Christian School, Bethlehem Chapman College, Rotorua SDA, Lake Taupō Christian School and Whakatāne SDA—eight other Christian schools of various sizes from a huge geographic spread across the central North Island.

This day provides amazing competition in sprints, relays, high jump, long jump and throwing with students competing in their specific age groups and gender. The competition is stiff and our students performed valiantly!

There are two levels of competition. A few compete at championship level with the rest competing at non-championship level. We were the defending school for the non-championship trophy which we have held for the last two years.

This year honours went to Hamilton Christian School who successfully defended the championship trophy, and Hamilton SDA who took the non-championship trophy. Matamata Christian School can certainly hold its head high though finishing in second place for both competitions! That's an impressive result given the level of competition and knowing we beat seven other schools each time to get there! We certainly have some impressive athletes performing at a high level.

### WHAT'S IN A NAME

Over the years Matamata Christian School has had two names. It started off in 1988 as Rainbow Park Christian School. This was derived at the time after a stunning rainbow prominently shone over the Kaimai's during stormy weather when the school was being set up in its previous site on Tower Road.

Several years later the school was renamed Matamata Christian School and was shifted to our current site here on Smith

Street. Last year, in collaboration with one of our local iwis, Ngāti Hauā, the School Board decided to include the Māori version of our name to our official school name too. Te Kura Karaitiana o Matamata is a direct translation of the name Matamata Christian School and will be used alongside it won't replace it. It is a name that we have made reference to in the past but is now officially part of our school name enabling it to be used interchangeably.

# From the Desk of the Tumuaki

This is the final school newsletter of the term. Though we are in the final two weeks there is still a lot happening so please keep reading to keep up with everything.

We are thrilled to welcome a new student into our Year 8 class this week. Klara van Blerk joins the group and we warmly welcome the van Blerk family into our school family.

# Changes

You will have noticed that the school has been going through a lot of change lately and there is a little more to come.

This term there has been a focus on property upgrades with ranch sliders being fitted to three classes, rooves over decks to two classes and new carpet fitted to another class. These holidays the Senior class will receive new carpet too.

Over the last six months there have also been bathroom upgrades and technology upgrades in each class. This has been in the form of new Interactive TV technology and an increase in iPads across the school.

Soon we are expecting the arrival of a new classroom block that will sit alongside Room 5. This is the first increase in classrooms for the school in 30 years so it is a pretty exciting time for the school. Our proprietors have already bought the block of two rooms that were built by and used in another school.


These classrooms are a big thing for us and we believe God has really blessed us with them. One is a standard classroom that is fully equipped with everything but furniture, and the other is a science lab! As a science lab it comes fully equipped with sinks, gas lines and even an emergency shower. This takes us quickly into the next level of development for the school for teaching science at the older years in the school.

We are hoping that this new classroom block will arrive early in Term 2. We are currently working through the consenting process with the Council and then the building will be able to be moved onsite and the school will be allowed to expand its roll from 120 students to 150.

You will also be aware that the school has had an application in with the Ministry of Education to expand our year levels to include Years 9 and 10 and to expand our numbers again to 175. This has come about as a request from a parent survey done in 2023 where the majority of parents asked us to consider moving up into Years 9 and 10. The Ministry are currently working through our application and have begun talks with us. We are hopeful for a successful outcome. The next three months is a crucial time in this process and will be when the bulk of this consideration is done. If successful Year 9 could start as early as next year with Year 10 starting in 2027. We know there is a lot going for us including the running of a successful Year 1—8 school at present and large population growth expected for Matamata over the next few years. Please pray earnestly with us in this process.

Our Proprietor Board have been working very hard on planning to accommodate this new growth and expansion. We look forward to sharing some of this with you at our mid-year AGM that is coming up.

We have great parent support for this trip and are excited to take a group of 50 with us. This includes 30 of our senior students and 11 adults, and we will be joined by six further students from Whakatane SDA School and three of their

adults.

Please remember that this trip is in Week 1 of Term 2. We leave early on Tuesday the 29th of April departing at 7:40AM. This means



students will need to be at school please by 7AM at the latest. Students from Whakatāne will be sleeping over at school the night before.

This year's costs will be \$320 per student and \$285 for an adult. This can be paid now or paid off in instalments over the year. Camps are one of the few school activities we charge for above attendance dues.



# **LEARNING JOURNAL NIGHT**

Next Wednesday, in the final week of term, family members are invited to your children's Learning Journal night. At the end of each of Terms 1 - 3 students bring parents and family in to share about their learning and work from the preceding term. This is a



student led interview where your child does most of the talking. Research shows that when students can understand and talk about their learning they will engage in and take more responsibility for their own development. Once this happens learning becomes deeper and more powerful. We really want to encourage you to take the time to be involved in this as your involvement is a key factor in your child's learning success helping demonstrate to them what importance you place on their learning.

This night will be held next week on **Wednesday the 9th of April**. Classrooms are open between 3:15PM and 7PM. You do not need to make an appointment, just come along anytime between these times. This is not a parent - teacher interview but teachers will be there to help with explanations as necessary.

As part of these sessions we will be giving you our parent-student goal setting sheet. We know that learning at school is only a part of the overall learning a child is involved in. At home it is likely you are helping them work on non-school related things too. These can be fun or important and personal. It might be about them learning to tie their laces, wanting to master doing a cart wheel, or a discipline such as learning an instrument, or something to do with benefitting their health. Whatever it is this is part of their holistic learning and we want to give you the opportunity to include it in their goal setting.

As always, if you would like to discuss any aspect of your child's learning further, please make a time with the teacher. This applies all year round as we want parents to feel able to come in any time of the year and as often as is necessary.

# **END OF TERM ASSEMBLY**

Our end of term assembly celebrating student achievement is on the last day of term, Friday the 11th of April, and all parents and family members are very welcome to attend. Please note that because these assemblies run a little longer it will be held at the earlier time of 1:30PM instead of the normal 2:15PM time.

# **TOUCH RUGBY COMES TO AN END**



# **COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES**

### **COMMUNITY NOTE**

Matamata Christian School values feedback and believes this is an important way for it to improve its performance. It believes complaints are a part of this and wishes to be able to resolve these in order to avoid anything standing in the way of it achieving its goals. Therefore anyone who may have a complaint about any part of the school life is encouraged to bring those complaints forward in a biblical manner. This means:

# To resolve conflict -

"If your brother sins against you, go to him and show him his fault. But do it privately, just between yourselves. If he listens to you, you have won your brother back. But if he will not listen to you, take one or two other persons with you, so that 'every accusation may be upheld by the testimony of two or more witnesses', as the scripture says."

- Matthew 18:15-16

"Remember this, my dear friends! Everyone must be quick to listen, but slow to speak and slow to become angry."

— James 1:19

"Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you."

It is important to respect a person's integrity by approaching them in confidence first to resolve this rather than sharing this with others. If a complaint is about wrongdoing between students at school please do not try to resolve this directly between other parents but get the classroom teacher to resolve this between families.
