

From the Desk of the Tumuaki

We are also looking forward to Mrs Stroebel, our new Junior teacher, joining us in a few week's time. Please continue to pray for her arrival and for everything to fall into place for her and her husband. We also offer our grateful thanks go to Miss Thomasen who has agreed to give us a few more weeks in the Junior class while we wait the arrival of Mrs Stroebel.

Truthfulness

This term our core value is truthfulness. This is something we welcome you to assist us with by working on at home too. As a core value it is an essential one as it is an important godly trait and is one that helps form and shape our reputation. During the term I hope to talk more about this with you and share stories that you can discuss at home too.

Honesty seems like a pretty core concept to teach our children – something is usually either a lie, or not (at least when dealing with under 10's). It's not a murky issue in the Bible either, which is full of stories of people being killed on the spot for lying (Ananias and Sapphira, and Achan, to name a few). The Bible also makes it very clear through the ninth commandment, throughout the letters of Paul, and in the Proverbs that lying is an affront to God.

But how do we show our kids examples from the Bible that won't scare them, like the stories of Ananias and Sapphira? How can we show them how much God loves truth – that indeed, God IS truth – and encourage them to live truthful, faithful lives? Here's the first Bible story to help teach your kids about honesty.

Zacchaeus from Luke 19:1-10

You likely remember the song about Zacchaeus, the wee little man who climbed up in a Sycamore tree, from our end of year production last year. But Zacchaeus' story has an important lesson about honesty. Zacchaeus was a tax collector, known for how rich he had become – likely by being dishonest and keeping some tax money for himself, as that was standard practice in the day. But one day, Jesus came to Zacchaeus' town and Zacchaeus had the chance to meet him. In fact, Jesus went to his house for dinner!

Zacchaeus was deeply moved and convicted during his time with Jesus which led to an amazing reaction. He told Jesus that he would give half of his possessions to the poor and that he would pay people back four times what he had cheated them. Not only did Zacchaeus see the error of his ways, but he had a total change of heart. He no longer wanted to live a dishonest life, but an honest one – because he came to know and believe in Jesus.

There is a short proverb about the importance of being honest in Proverbs 14:25. The NIV translation says it well – "A truthful witness saves lives, but a false witness is a traitor."





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Truthfulness Quote

Truthfulness is at the foundation of all personal excellence."

Read this proverb with your family, and then ask them to think of an example (real or not) of this. This will help them see the emotional consequences of lying, and will help them internalise the importance of always telling the truth. Spend time talking this through with them as these conversations are where things deepen and our children learn to trust you and be more willing to talk with you. Be open and let it come from your heart, you won't regret these opportunities you spend with your family.

YEAR 7/8 NORTHLAND CAMP

Tomorrow our Senior class leave for their bi-annual history trip to explore early New Zealand history. They are travelling to Northland where much of New Zealand's early formative years



took place with the journey we take retracing some of those key events. Our trip centres around Russell, the first capital of New Zealand, Waitangi, Kerikeri and Marsden Cross, the site where the Christian message was first preached in this country.

We have great parent support for this trip and are excited to take a group of 51 with us. This includes 30 of our senior students and 13 adults, and we will be joined by six further students from Whakatāne SDA School and three of their adults.

Please remember we leave early tomorrow morning (Tuesday the 29th of April) departing at 7:40AM. This means students will need to be at school please by 7AM at the latest. Students from Whakatāne will be sleeping over at school tonight ready for the trip.

This year's costs will be \$320 per student and \$285 for an adult. This can be paid now or paid off in instalments over the year. Camps are one of the few school activities we charge for above attendance dues.

This is an amazing trip and all that are coming can expect a memorable experience.

WE NEED A BIT OF HELP PLEASE


As part of our Permaculture programme this term we will be cooking some of the crops we have been growing with our students over two Wednesdays.

IMPORTANT REMINDERS FROM THE PERIA CHRISTIAN EDUCATION PROPRIETOR BOARD

PCE PROPRIETOR BOARD ELECTION

Recently you will have received by email, notification of the upcoming election for the Peria Christian Education (PCE) Proprietor Board. PCE are the body that owns the school property, and are responsible for the buildings, property development, and for protecting the school's special Christian character. This year there are four board positions available, including two of the three designated seats (see below), and nominations for these positions are being sought. Nominations close at 3PM this Tuesday the 29th of April.

PROPRIETOR BOARD SUPPORT FOR THE MATAMATA CHRISTIAN SCHOOL BOARD

A very important function of the PCE Proprietor Board (PB) is to support the School Board (SB) in it's role as the School's governing body. Alongside the four parent representatives, the staff representative and the Principal, the Proprietor Board is allowed three seats on the School Board, and the PB has set aside three designated seats on the PB to fill the three SB seats known as Proprietor Board School Board seats, (PBSB seats).

Proprietor Board Trustees on the School Board, will have full SB Member rights and responsibilities, and in addition they will have full PB Trustee rights and responsibilities, with the exception that they are not required to attend Proprietor Board meetings, although they are expected to keep abreast of Proprietor Board matters.

One of the three PBSB member seats is presently filled, and the PB is looking for two more Trustees to fill the remaining two seats. 

COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES

COMMUNITY NOTE

Matamata Christian School values feedback and believes this is an important way for it to improve its performance. It believes complaints are a part of this and wishes to be able to resolve these in order to avoid anything standing in the way of it achieving its goals. Therefore anyone who may have a complaint about any part of the school life is encouraged to bring those complaints forward in a biblical manner. This means:

To resolve conflict -

"If your brother sins against you, go to him and show him his fault. But do it privately, just between yourselves. If he listens to you, you have won your brother back. But if he will not listen to you, take one or two other persons with you, so that 'every accusation may be upheld by the testimony of two or more witnesses', as the scripture says."

- Matthew 18:15-16

In response to complaints -

"Remember this, my dear friends! Everyone must be quick to listen, but slow to speak and slow to become angry."

— James 1:19

"Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you."

— Ephesians 4:32

Please remember that complaints can be embarrassing for people. It is important to respect a person's integrity by approaching them in confidence first to resolve this rather than sharing this with others. If a complaint is about wrongdoing between students at school please do not try to resolve this directly between other parents but get the classroom teacher to resolve this between families.

If a complaint is about a School Board issue or matter please use the School Board complaints procedures chart (available from school).
