STUDYING OUR EARLIEST HISTORY IN THE NORTH


In the first week of term our Senior class ventured to the far north to explore some of New Zealand's earliest history. After encountering a round of torrential rain during our travel to Russell, the weather cleared for the remainder of our time allowing us to appreciate the true beauty of the Bay of Islands (we hear the weather system moved down to visit the Waikato instead!).

We shared our time with a small group from Whakatāne SDA School who had been asking to be included on our trip. From this some awesome new friendships were formed between our group and theirs and we look forward to seeing them again.

Our students had many experiences including the Hundertwasser Art Museum in Whangārei, Waitangi, Kemp House and the Stone Store, Marsden Cross where the Christian message was preached for the first time in this country, Pompallier House Printery, visiting the oldest church in New Zealand which included bullet holes in the side of the building, Hongi Heke's flagpole, Robertson Island where we retraced Captain Cook's first steps in the Bay of Islands, and a stunning boat ride exploring the outer bays and watching some endangered species of birds nesting. Along with all these places came the unique stories that went with them that all helped define New Zealand as the country we are today.

Huge thanks go to all our amazing parent supporters that we had and the efforts of Food Trip owned by the Ugalde family from our school who cooked all the food. Darwin had pre cooked all our meals and brought them up to restaurant class before sending them along to camp with us where Frenzy did the final details. The food was stunning and a real talking point! Most of us are looking forward to visiting Food Trip to experience some of their fine food again.

From the Desk of the Tumuaki

It's been an exciting start to the term with our Senior class history camp to Northland last week. This is always an amazing experience and it was great to be able to run our 9th trip for this and to have such an awesome bunch of students and parents to take.

I want to thank everyone for accommodating our Teacher Only Day last Friday. We recognise that this provides challenges for different families but it is appreciated. We were involved in whole school Mathematics development with the Ministry of Education around the new Mathematics Curriculum that has been introduced this year. We have been teaming up with three other Christian Schools to work through this—Southcity Christian School, Waipa Christian School and Hamilton SDA. This development is proving to be very valuable.

There is a lot on in this very short term. Please read through the events and keep up to date each time a new newsletter comes out as many of these things affect you and we don't want you to miss out.

Truthfulness

This term our core value is truthfulness. This is something we welcome you to assist us with by working on at home too. As a core value it is an essential one as it is an important godly trait and is one that helps form and shape our reputation. During the term I hope to talk more about this with you and share stories that you can discuss at home too. Today's story is about Elisha's servant Gehazi who did a terribly dishonest thing.

Gehazi from 2 Kings 5

For background to the events of Gehazi read with your family the amazing event of Naaman being healed of leprosy from 2 Kings 5:1—18. This was an amazing healing that took place as having leprosy was a really major thing back in these times. This story has a sour side to it though and it comes from Gehazi, the servant of Elisha after Naaman sets off to return home. Gehazi is driven by greed and sets off after him with a lie to tell. Read on in 2 Kings 5:19—27 and discuss these questions together with your children:

Why did Gehazi go back and see Naaman?

What did he tell Naaman?


Why do you think he did this?

What did Elisha ask Gehazi?

What was the punishment that God provided for Gehazi? How does this make you feel about the consequences of Gehazi's actions?

God used Elisha to help heal Naaman of his leprosy. After he was healed, Naaman was so thankful, he offered Elisha a gift, but Elisha refused to take it. Later, Elisha's servant, Gehazi, ran after Naaman and pretended that Elisha had changed his mind and did want a gift after all. Naaman happily gave Gehazi silver and clothing. But God showed Elisha everything that had happened, and how Gehazi had lied. The punishment for his deceitfulness was the awful and dreaded disease leprosy – the very thing Naaman had been healed of. As a result Gehazi not only lost the trust of his master, but he also lost his health.

The impact of this was a really high price to pay for Gehazi. Before we tell lies to get something we want, we must remember that lying will not please God or our parents. The point then is that it is not worth gaining any material possessions if it means we lose the trust of others and cause God to be disappointed with us.

Let's really help our children to see the value of truthfulness.

Mrs Stroebel and her husband landed in Auckland yesterday and have travelled to stay with her brother in Rotorua for a time.






Mrs Stroebel will be taking over the Junior class officially from next Monday the 19th of May.

In this next week look out for an email requesting your dinner order and dietary needs. Please fill this in and return it to school as soon as possible to help us plan for the night.



IT'S OP SHOP TIME!

Each year in May we get a turn to run our local op shop for a week. This is a tremendous fundraiser for the school which allows us to take all the profits raised once

the weekly rental of the premises is taken out. The school has traditionally done very well out of this.

Our turn for this is next week and runs from Monday the 19th to Friday the 23rd of May.

In order for this to be a success we really need your help with two things please:


- 1. If you are having a clean out at home and have items that you are not trying to sell yourself and are willing to donate, we would be very grateful to receive these please. These can be brought to school from now until the 19th of May, and after the 19th dropped straight off to the Op Shop at the Rawhiti end of Arawa Street.
- 2. We need lots of help through the week of Monday the 19th to Friday the 23rd of May to run the shop. We need to have at least three people running the shop at a time. If you can please spare some time, even if only an hour or two, let Sarah in the school office know, or text Maria McGhie directly on 021 024 82307. Maria is in charge of this event for us again this year.

TECH ARTS CHANGES

This year the money we raise at the Op Shop will help us develop our own Tech Arts facilities. Tech Arts starts at Year 7 and 8 and will include Years 9 and 10 if we are granted the chance to expand into these levels. Starting late last year we took over the delivery of our Tech Arts programme instead of outsourcing this to the local Intermediate. We have fine tuned the programme and made a number of changes:

Tech Arts now focuses on three core components instead of multiple subjects. We have brought it back to Food Tech, Hard Materials such as Woodwork, and we are

reintroducing Soft Materials such as Sewing. Over the years subjects such as Art. Social Studies and Science had been added in but we have removed these from the Tech Arts banner as they are already covered in our classroom programmes. This year Year 7 and 8





Tech Arts is now run across three full days per term (usually three Thursdays of a term) instead of $1^{1}/_{2}$ hours per week with our students walking to the Intermediate for each session. Students will still go to the Intermediate for Food Tech and Hard Materials to use their facilities, but it will be for full days each time. The three days is the equivalent of the original $1^{1}/_{2}$ hours per week but is a more efficient use of time because less pack ups are required and less time is lost walking between each of the two schools.


With new buildings soon set to arrive we will begin to incorporate some of our Tech Arts programmes, starting with Sewing, onsite here at MCS and we will invest in the resources we need for this, such as sewing machines and related materials required. This term we are investing in a number of machines which we will build on over time. While these machines are essentially for Years 7—10 there may be times, such as when we do events like Wearable Arts, where Year 6 students may also have supervised access to them too.

Our first new building also includes a science lab which we will be setting up for use across the school levels.

WE NEED A BIT OF HELP PLEASE

As part of our Permaculture programme this term we will be cooking some of the crops we have been growing with our students over two Wednesdays. For this we need

some help please with the supply of electric frying pans. In total we need eight and would be grateful for any offers to help us by lending these to us for the 4th and 11th of June please. We also



need some old ice cream containers for storing the soup if people have some spares they do not need, and we would really like some adult help on both the 4th and 11th as we prepare food and cook please. Again, please let is know if you are able to assist us. We realise these two dates are still a number of weeks away but we are trying to be well organised—if you let us know you can help we will remind you closer to the date.



Our Term 2 Scola mufti day is coming up on **Wednesday the 4th of June**.


Scola is our Ugandan World Vision sponsored child our students support as part of our commitment to both our service and compassion core values

WINTER UNIFORM

COMPLAINTS PROCEDURES

COMMUNITY NOTE

Matamata Christian School values feedback and believes this is an important way for it to improve its performance. It believes complaints are a part of this and wishes to be able to resolve these in order to avoid anything standing in the way of it achieving its goals. Therefore anyone who may have a complaint about any part of the school life is encouraged to bring those complaints forward in a biblical manner. This means:

To resolve conflict -

"If your brother sins against you, go to him and show him his fault. But do it privately, just between yourselves. If he listens to you, you have won your brother back. But if he will not listen to you, take one or two other persons with you, so that 'every accusation may be upheld by the testimony of two or more witnesses', as the scripture says."

- Matthew 18:15-16

In response to complaints -

"Remember this, my dear friends! Everyone must be quick to listen, but slow to speak and slow to become angry."

— James 1:19

"Be kind to one another, tender hearted, forgiving one another, even as God for Christ's sake has forgiven you."

— Ephesians 4:32

Please remember that complaints can be embarrassing for people. It is important to respect a person's integrity by approaching them in confidence first to resolve this rather than sharing this with others. If a complaint is about wrongdoing between students at school please do not try to resolve this directly between other parents but get the classroom teacher to resolve this between families.
